## Why I won't be in Church on 8<sup>th</sup> July

Soon after we arrived in Canada in 2011 and almost a year before Suzanna began working as a United Church of Canada Minister we went to Augustine United Church in Winnipeg,

(<u>augustineunitedchurch.org</u>) and I wept from the beginning to the end of the service. I'm a big girl and "Big girls don't cry" so why was I so moved?

I wept because for the first time in 61 years I was sitting in a church service holding hands with my wife and in that place, even though I didn't know anyone, I felt safe. Even if I had known these people all my life I would not be judged or condemned or treated as "other". In this place, in this church, for the first time ever, I could just be and that feeling overwhelmed me for the hour of that service.

Perhaps you know what it's like to live with something that "normal people" and our "society" or "culture" find "difficult": perhaps a family secret; a hurting relationship; abuse of some sort; memories you wish would disappear; failed marriages; feelings you don't think you should have; disability; mental illness; guilt; fear of death; overwhelming fear of, or anxiety about, all sorts of things; being different; or any one of those other hundred taboos we find so difficult to talk about.

Being a Lesbian Christian has been one those taboos for me, but not any longer. I will not be in church on July 8<sup>th</sup> because I will be in Victoria with others from United Churches all over the Island participating in the Victoria Pride Parade.

There will be hundreds, if not thousands of other people, either participating in, or cheering on, the parade. There will be a huge outpouring of exuberance, joy and celebration and people will put themselves out there for a moment of recognition of the

tremendous diversity of humanity which refuses to be channeled into little labelled boxes.

Many will also remember those who have travelled



much harder roads to enable us to be here. Many have died in the struggle. Many more have been and are being persecuted, thrown to the metaphorical lions, imprisoned, thrown off buildings, raped, murdered or executed for being "different" in many parts of the world. There is no room for complacency. Being able to participate in Victoria Pride and walk with other Christians is a privilege I cannot take for granted. I hope you will join me.

# Conversation

I wonder, if St Paul's congregation would consider exploring with me becoming an Affirming Congregation?

# What does it mean to be an Affirming Congregation?

An "Affirming Congregation" in the United Church of Canada is one that has intentionally reflected upon what it means to be inclusive; one that has evaluated its openness to the ongoing work about how it welcomes and includes others within the life and work of the church. Moreover, the Affirming Congregation has "publicly declared their commitment to inclusion and justice for people of all sexual orientations and gender identities. Although Affirming Ministries make an explicit statement about issues of sexuality and gender, their commitment to justice is far broader. They continually grow and change as they seek to live more fully into God's way of welcome, love, and justice for all creation". Please see affirmunited.ause.ca

#### What might an Affirming Process look like?

The process of becoming an Affirming Ministry takes time, and includes many opportunities for learning, conversation, dialogue and reflection. Congregations have had some studies for all ages, invited guest speakers and created some fun events.

#### Aren't we already Affirming?

We might wonder: we're already welcoming, aren't we? Why do we need to become Affirming? While it is true that our faith community strives to be inclusive, and already has many signs of this, there is value in making a public statement of welcome. Many people continue to hear voices of condemna-

tion, exclusion and hatred within the church and in society. By making a public statement about who we are and what we believe, an Affirming Ministry would commit us to being intentional about the ongoing work of including others within our life and work.

All I'm asking at this stage is, please think about it. If there are folk who want further discussion, please do contact me. If St Paul's does embark on this journey together then we might look at next year (2019) to make some beginnings.

## **Children's Ministry Co-Ordinator**

We are very excited to announce that the Church Council has approved the creating of a new lay staff position at St Paul's! We wish to find a person who will be our Children's Ministry Co-Ordinator to build and develop a weekly children's programme at St Paul's for children 0-12 years. In addition, the person will organise a Messy Church event once a month for children and their families.

The position will be 25 hours a month for 10 months a year and will be funded by the Memorial Fund of St Paul's. The position will be advertised in August and it is hoped that our new Children's Ministry Co-ordinator will begin to work with us when the children return to school in September.

### ST PAUL'S BUILDING & PROPERTY COMMITTEE

Update on use of the sanctuary: the sanctuary has been used for two concerts and a town hall meeting during the months of April, May, and June.

#### **The Front Entrance - Progress**

Work started on the front doors on April 25 and has been proceeding very well. The new entrance is all framed and tar paper has been placed on the roof to prevent rain from coming into the structure. There have been no surprises to date and there was no rot found in the main wall of the sanctuary.

Two meetings were held with the contractor on May 31 and June 1 to discuss colours for the doors, windows frames, roof, and flooring, and the number of electrical outlets required. It was decided to have an electrical outlet in each of the four corners of the new entrance. This way any electrical requirement for decorating will not need extension cords. There will also be an outside outlet located near the eave on the west side to facilitate Christmas lighting.

The metal roof has arrived and the framing is continuing for the front sidewalks and stairs. They began pouring the concrete on Friday June 15 and will continue with the pathways soon. The first invoice for the work done in April and May has arrived and has been approved by the property committee. The costs so far are within budget.

#### **GOOD NEWS:**

The completion date for the new front entrance is August 4, 2018!

On July 11, 2018 the Sidney Preschool will be working on playground projects and their equipment. Volunteers from Home Depot and parents from the play school will be doing the work.



#### SOUND SYSTEM UPDATE

Pam, David and Terrisa met with Pacific Audio Works to obtain advice on speakers for the choir loft. They advised us that our sound system needs to be upgraded. They also made some suggestions regarding hearing assistance for the sanctuary.

Further discussion will take place when the cost estimates have been received. David Hempsall has obtained a \$2,000 grant from Thrifty's for this project (money to be raised using Smile Cards). We really do want to improve the overall sound in the church, and look forward to beginning this project.

#### **PASTORAL CARE**

St Paul's Pastoral Care Committee is planning two special events for the fall:

Rev. Suzanna would like to hold a special memorial service to remember folks who have passed away and have not been formally remembered at St. Paul's. Often these people have played a significant role in the life of our congregation that has sometimes not been acknowledged. A Memorial Service can also be a time for us to remember friends and family members who have passed and give thanks for the special part they played in our lives. We are looking to October 14<sup>th</sup> for this Memorial Service. It would be a Sunday afternoon and will be followed by a light tea. If you think friends and family outside of St. Paul's congregation would be interested in attending, please help us spread the word.

We are planning to hold another membership Sunday and are looking to Sunday, November 18<sup>th</sup>. This would be an opportunity for people who are new to St. Paul's, as well as those not so new, to formalize their membership. Rev. Suzanna will offer a time for instruction and conversation on membership. The "Welcome into Membership Service" would be followed by a luncheon at which time we would introduce all our new friends, whether or not they choose to formalize their membership, to the congregation.

The Pastoral Care Committee sponsors a group of ladies who

knit or crochet prayer shawls to be given to anyone who needs a little comfort in their lives. The shawls are also offered in times of celebration.
