It's simply part of who we are, to connect with the environment around us.



We know, however, that sometimes life's situations take us out of our natural environment. We can get too busy and distracted. We can become ill or simply unable to do the things we once did. But sometimes, we just forget who we are.

All this call to connect with nature, or reconnect perhaps only emphasizes more and more that we



have become disconnected. Disconnected from the earth, disconnected from each other as human beings, from the creatures of the earth, from our planet's rhythms and cycles.

Sometimes we do need a reminder of who we are and when we participate in an activity, our bodies, as well as our minds, our emotions, our feelings, our senses are engaged and all these can remind us that we are already part of the cosmic heartbeat that is life. Let us breath the air deeply and gratefully as we affirm our place in the beautiful and mysterious universe.



The summer has been a wonderful experience for our music ministry. Throughout June - August we have had a Summer Choir averaging 18 members per Sunday. We have also provided musical support for funerals/memorial services by leading in the hymn singing for these services.

Our Fall season started with a joyous Labour Day weekend. Guest artists, Bruce and Cheryl Harding from the lower mainland, led a joint Saturday and Sunday of music, prayer and praise. It started with rehearsals for both instrumentalists and singers on Saturday, August 31. Over 45 musicians from Central



Saanich, St. John's, and St. Paul's United Churches spent a remarkable 3+ hours learning, singing, and enjoying the Harding's gifts of music and spirit-filled fun. On Sunday, the musicians under Bruce's leadership helped a packed sanctuary worship, sing new



music, and be part of the "Welcome Table". Three congregations worshiping together with energy, love and fellowship. What a spirit-filled day this was, and what a wonderful start to our new season.

The Music Ministry at St. Paul's is alive and growing, both in numbers and number of groups.

The **St. Paul's Choir** started rehearsals on Thursday, September 5, with a great turnout and lots of enthusiasm. However, we would still like new members to join us, especially men. The ability to read music is not necessary. All that required is a love of singing, the ability to carry a tune, and willingness to become part of a friendly, energetic group who wish you to join them. We rehearse hymns, both familiar and new, for Sunday worship, and work to prepare a special choral piece for most Sundays. The choir currently rehearsed from 6.30-8.30 pm in the sanctuary and all are welcome to join in!

The **Jam Band** is taking on a new look and musical feel this year. It is our hope that we will expand from basically a group of fun-filled ukulele players, to a group of fun-filled instrumentalists and singers of all types. We would like to make this a true "Jam Band"...a group of instrumentalists and singers that gets together to play and sing for fun. There will be one added component that is new this year. Part of our repertoire will be songs that we can use in Sunday worship. It is the plan that we will be the facilitating music group at Sunday morning worship about 5 – 7 times each year. We currently do not have a day or time for regular weekly rehearsals, but we would like anyone who is interested in joining us

There will be a new music group at St. Paul's this year. A Women's Ensemble is in the formation stages. We don't have a day or time for rehearsal yet, but we are gathering the names of interested people so that we can get started. This group is open to any women who would like to sing with us, both members of St. Paul's and singers from the community. There are a few requirements, however. The ensemble will sing at Sunday morning worship once each month between October - May and singers are expected to attend unless excused by the director. Also, we would like singers to be able to read music or at least be willing the spend the time necessary to learn notes. The repertoire will be more complex and will usually be in either 3 or 4 part female harmony [SSA or SSAA]. Please contact me if you are interested in joining this fun-filled, but also hard-working choral group.

The 'Creation Time' symbol consists of a tall tree with prominent roots and green leaves. It is a sign of life and growth. Flowing around the tree is a

large blue circle, a symbol of God's eternity and the colour of the earth from space.

The four sections of the circle are reminders of the four seasons, the four directions of the compass, the four aspects of humanity (mind, body, heart and spirit). The four orange sections form a cross and the four colours included in the symbol represent the four elements of creation: earth/brown, air/white, fire/orange and water/blue.
